My fear is that the Pandemic will happen again. (4th grade girl)


Reflections

Zoom school was fun in the beginning but then I got bored because I couldn't concentrate. Being in person for school feels better. (3rd grade boy)


I enjoyed school online because during my break my cousin and I were able to play Barbie house and the Barbie camper. (2nd grade girl)

Over the last year we have prayed that the Lord would illuminate what is hidden at the Murphy Drill Site, a toxic oil drilling site in our neighborhood. Divine appointments have led us to the site at just the right moments to gather evidence that has launched several regulatory investigations.

In January, our call to the South Coast Air Quality Management District led to two Notices of Violation. One was for degassing five 21,000-gallon frac tanks within 1000 feet of a K-12 school. The other was for lying about the nearest resident. The operator said the distance was ½-mile, not 40-feet.

In March, our report to the California Highway Patrol of an unlicensed truck deploying radioactive materials (i.e. "R/A Material") confirmed that the operator lacked three required permits needed to drive the vehicle.

In April, Cal OSHA opened an investigation in response to our photos of workers without face shields being sprayed with oil, workers smoking, men working in the dark, and other dangerous practices.

In April our photos of unpermitted acid maintenance moved the City to order the oil company to come in for a full review of its operating conditions. This is the same process we used to put the Jefferson Drill Site on a path closure and clean-up.

Recently, we asked the courts to compel the LAFD fire chief to enforce fire code rules for idle wells. These wells must be capped to keep toxic and explosive gases from reaching the surface. For more than a year he has refused to take action.

Meanwhile, a new USC study found a substantial decrease in lung size and strength for residents living within 1000 meters downwind of the drill site. The reduction was larger than those living next to freeways or regularly exposed to secondhand smoke.

Children in our community are beginning their lives with smaller, weaker lungs with enormous implications for their ability to live a healthy life, compete in sports, avoid asthma and other respiratory diseases. Step by step we are gaining traction for the urgent work of closing and cleaning up this drill site.

Nobody expects to see toxic drill sites in the Kingdom of God. So when we pray, "Your Kingdom come. Your will be done, in the neighborhood as it is in heaven", it is a prayer to end neighborhood oil drilling. Please join us in praying for the L.A. Catholic Archdiocese to break the oil operator's lease in love for their South LA neighbors, for the City to close the site, and for a beneficial use—like a park—to take its place.
